We were contacted regarding a study involving Waldorf graduates. Below is the letter we received, if any of you are interested the contact information is included in the letter.

March 9, 2005

Dear Waldorf Graduate:

As a Waldorf graduate, you are being invited to participate in an education research study called Waldorf Graduates' Reflections on Art Experience and Engendered Aesthetic Code. This study is being conducted as part of my doctoral dissertation in the Department of Learning, Teaching, and Curriculum at the University of Missouri-Columbia. The study seeks to describe the kinds of art experiences that Waldorf graduates have had in their Lower and Upper Schools. The study will also examine the relationship between these past art experiences and the Waldorf graduates' current attitudes toward art. A significant benefit of participating in this study is the opportunity for the Waldorf graduates to gain insight from the reflection process.

My study is a narrative study where data will be gained from Waldorf graduates' through one-on-one email interviews. I will provide participating Waldorf graduates some interviews prompts that will promote reflection about art experiences. The questions that I will pose are open-ended with no single answer; thus any thought or opinion the participants have will be valid and appreciated. The data or stories gained in this process will be co-constructed between the participants and myself; I will provide all participants the opportunity to confirm the narratives and reflections.

As previously stated, the results of this study will be included in my doctoral dissertation. Findings from the study will be presented to other educators and interested parties through professional conference presentations and journal publications. All participant information will be presented anonymously and data will be kept confidential. Neither the participants' names, nor their school(s), will be published in the study. The data collected will not be used for evaluative purposes. Please note that participation is voluntary. Choosing not to participate has no imposed consequences or prejudices and you may discontinue participation at anytime. If you choose to participate in this study, you will share personal art experiences in three to five email responses. The time commitment for the totality of your responses would be approximately one hour. I anticipate the interviews being conducted through the months of March—May. Thank you for your consideration of participation.
